Evidently, Stone was rejected as a judge by the Senate - Key reports on the subsequent actions to find someone else. The best bet is Brooke. "Now all Burior's [?] library is up & under my care, it is well that of the Literary folks in & out of Congress - many very many of the books are now to be had in cheapened & equally good editions, but as the competition seems to be very promising, both for individuals & even for the Congressional Library for some, I have determined with the advice of friends to sell the whole at auction next Monday & Tuesday." "No conjectures yet that can be relied on as to the Cabinet - many think that Polk will not make the selection till he gets here as Jackson did, which is expected to be about the 10th of Feb. Texas on gaining her position in the Union is the absorbing question, it ununexpectedly gained considerable strength in the house, when it was seen that it would pass. Much doubt exists as to the action of the Senate, but a growing feeling may help it then & even Mr. Clay divines it to be put out of the way of the next campaign - some say it will pass the Senate; some that it will pass by a majority of ten votes, and I am pleased to say that our senator Col.
